



Vith regret we note the passing of one of our foundation members and former club President. Graham Had a hart attack and subsequently deceased on Thursday, March 2nd, 2006.

He became involved with the Cobra Replica scene after the meeting of Cobra owners and drivers on the South Perth foreshore back in 1994, and when Perry Lucas formed a group Graham was seconded as treasurer.

Some time later [1997] when it was decided to form a real club, Graham was elected as the inaugural President, a position he held on three occasions, as well as a term as a Vice President. During these early years our membership was only thirty or so and Graham tried hard to get members more involved in club activities.

With this in mind he devised the concept of the Best Clubman Award, a perpetual trophy to be given to the person voted the club's leading contributor, which continues to this day.

Graham later became involved in manufacturing Cobra chassis units, which after considerable efforts, were certified to Transport Department Specifications.

Although a bit of a Cobra diehard, he had possibly one of the longest uncompleted projects in the club, which he eventually lost interest in, and sold.

In the later years we have not seen so much of him, but his readiness to volunteer in club activities, and club runs, will be missed.

He earned the nickname of "SPIN" on one such autumn club run when deciding he was a bit chilly, reached across under the half tonneau grabbing a acket and pulling it towards him promptly caught the shifter in his British racing green beastie causing it to select reverse gear while belting down the oad at 100 kays. This sent him spinning down the road and after completing several dizzying circles he came to rest in the middle of the black stuff unable to believe his luck. After settling his nerves he again caught up with the rest of the group however those present were sure he was riding higher in the seat than previously.

When we met at Graham's funeral I mentioned a funny anecdote concerning our friend and fellow enthusiasts, Graham Sach.

WHITEMAN PARK & SHOW & SHINE 2006


Well it was Show & Shine time again and it was also the Classic Car Show again—this year our Cobra Car Club combined both events into one and the result was spectacular.

The day was forecast to be 36 degrees which is hot, but we still had an excellent turn out of membe and their Cobras.

I suppose the event started late Saturday afternoon with Dave and Jessie Kent setting up a-home-away-from-home with their mobile home and gazebos—there were also a few members and friends who joined them through the evening to be able to stake out the "Cobra Territory" and protect it till reinforcements arrived in the morning. As I wandered around the show, I noticed there were some excellent displays all set out nicely on the grass amongst the trees and the shade, there were also many little stores and shops set up to cater for the crowd. No matter how many times I toured around the show, I still could not find one display that came close to our "Show & Shine".

The cars were lined up on both sides in a "V", angle parked and facing to the centre, coming together near the bus and gazebos, this format gave the visitors plenty of room to inspect all the cars. The display was packed all day with many people coming back 3 or 4 times just to look at the Cobras and ask many questions, along with the dream of having one, mind you, there we also many Cobra experts passing through who could tell the 'real ones' from the copies, nevertheless all the people going around the show were there because they like cars, which is very different to the Burswood picnicker's who were just filling in a bit of time. Valentines Day 2006







As I write this I reflect upon an anonymous letter read to the club at the February meeting.


